\$30 million to the Tasmanian Government to support the supermarket sector									
Party:	Australian Greens								

Summary of proposal:

The proposal would provide \$30 million in 2025-26 to the Tasmanian Government to help discount retailers in the state, break the supermarket duopoly and cut grocery bills.

The proposal would be non-ongoing and include departmental funding from within the capped amount.

The proposal would start from 1 July 2025.

Costing overview

The proposal would be expected to decrease the fiscal and underlying cash balances by \$30 million over the 2025-26 Budget forward estimates period (see Table 1). This impact reflects an increase in administered expenses.

The proposal would not be expected to have an impact beyond the 2025-26 Budget forward estimates period, other than for public debt interest (PDI) costs. A breakdown of the financial implications (including separate PDI tables) over the period to 2035-36 is provided at Attachment A.

The Parliamentary Budget Office (PBO) has not made any assessment as to whether the specified funding would be sufficient to meet the objectives of the proposal.

Key assumptions and methodology

The proposal is capped at a fixed amount in 2025-26. Departmental expenses associated with providing funding to the Tasmanian Government are expected to be small and are assumed to be absorbed within existing resources of the relevant department. Administered expenses are as specified. We assume that no funds allocated to a given year are left unspent.
